The Logie Legacy is a registered charity with the purposes of:

- 1. Supporting the formally established twinning partnership with NHS Borders to achieve improvements in education, service delivery and patient experience at St Francis Hospital (SFH), Zambia
- 2. Promoting the value of voluntary engagement in global health for NHS Borders staff and partners in bringing knowledge, skills and ideas back to the UK
- 3. Raising income and monitoring expenditure in the support of the above

Past & Present

Our roots go back to 1991 when Dr Sandy Logie from the Borders General Hospital, Scotland went to volunteer at SFH. Since then many more staff have supported various projects. It has 450 beds with a high occupancy rate often exceeding 100% - patients on floor. Located in the Eastern Province of Zambia it serves a population of 1 million, nearly 60% of which fall below the poverty line (\$1.90 per day). Approximately 70,000 patients are seen annually for day care. The hospital is a government grant aided institution, jointly managed by the Anglican and Catholic dioceses. It has training schools for Registered Nursing, Public Health Nursing and Midwifery.

The Covid-19 pandemic has impacted on the way we have operated. Travel restrictions and the need to focus on clinical responsibilities in Scotland have meant none of our volunteers have been to Zambia since 2019. However we have worked hard to maintain our support from afar and seized opportunities to review ways of strengthening our partnership in the years to come. Key examples include the following:

- Leading on the development of a network of UK and European partners supporting SFH. Establishing regular video link meetings with hospital management and network partners
- 2. Strengthening digital infrastructure information technology capacity by securing funding for Wi-Fi routers and data packages
- Providing financial assistance in purchasing personal protective equipment for staff
- Funding two bike repair and maintenance workshops as well as providing suitable wet season clothing for the TB community support volunteers
- 5. Working with Scottish
 Government Global Health
 Coordination Unit and KidsOR to
 secure equipment (10 oxygen
 concentrators, 4 ventilators and 2
 ventilator trolleys) to better
 prepare for the pandemic





- 6. Strengthening cardiology support through the procurement of a cardiac probe and offering continued support for its use
- 7. Continued support for the Water for Life programme two new bore holes and submersible pumps
- 8. Completion of a Scottish Government funded project (through CORRA Foundation) to review our partnership. Key partnership recommendations included: Need to modernise the approach to partnerships; Develop a strategic plan and clear lines of accountability; Start building African capacity; Facilitate a Zambian project management team. Key project recommendations include: Creating a framework for selecting projects; Creating a framework for managing projects; Supporting volunteer management.

The future of our partnership?

Our trustees offer these reflections.

Brian Magowan (Chairperson & Consultant Obstetrician)

Colleagues at SFH have shown remarkable courage and resilience during the significant pressures imposed by increasing workload demands and resource constraints. Particular tribute is paid to Dr Lalick Banda (medical



superintendent) and Mr Fred Ntongwe (chief administrator) for their leadership and commitment to strengthen the partnership with us back here in Scotland.

SFH undertakes a staggering 4,000+ deliveries annually with sustained reductions in infant and maternal mortality rates. This is enormously encouraging in the light of practical and educational support we have offered to staff in the recent past.

It is important that we look forward as a charity and reassess our goals. Personnel move on and projects draw to a close and yet new needs arise continually. Realistic expectations are needed if our ambitions are to be met. Fresh interest is to be welcomed. Of immense importance has been the recognition formally by the Board of NHS Borders of the value of our contribution to global health and the positive impact this has had on our volunteers on their local roles in the Borders.


Chris Faldon (Consultant Nurse)

We are committed to emerge stronger as a partnership following the weakening impact of the pandemic. As the Immunisation Coordinator for NHS Borders I was mightily relieved at the roll out of the vaccination programme and thrilled to see our local population uptake being amongst the highest in Scotland. This undoubtedly saved many lives. Zambia on the other hand did not receive their vaccine supplies until many months later than the UK. Sadly we learned of the deaths of several staff members as well as patients. There has been a high level of vaccine hesitancy, causing Zambia to fall below the 10% of the adult

population. This increases the likelihood of devastating infection waves and there is still much work to be done.

The country's economic growth has been flattening over the past decade and health and

economic prospects have further worsened in the wake of the pandemic. For example the rate of the reduction in TB cases has slowed. Encouragingly the hospital in 2022 has recently been awarded a higher status of funding by the Zambian Ministry of Health in recognition of its quality care and strategic importance to the remote Eastern region. Basic needs we take for granted in the UK however still go unmet. We will continue to work with our Zambian colleagues to identify and support projects they see as high priority but have minimal prospect of local funding. Building on our highly successful 'Water For Life' project we are now setting our



sights on a radical overhaul of the hospital sanitation system, a vital necessity as hospital patient and workforce activity increases.

Alison Aitken (Secretary and retired nurse)

The work undertaken to review our charities governance arrangements will undoubtedly hold dividends for the long term. New volunteers will be key to this and it is important that we seek ways to recruit and better support these. The strengthening of relationships through our UK and European Partner network has been particularly pleasing to note. It has enabled us to work more collaboratively and efficiently with others. More importantly it has reduced the impact of the constraints imposed by the pandemic by seeking out ways to better connect remotely with one another.

Our finances are in good shape as concluded in our recent audit of the accounts. We are confident that that current projects represent good value for money and future ones will be carefully scrutinised and contribute to sustainable developments with long lasting impacts. We are extremely grateful to our many supporters for their generous and very welcome gifts to enable our valuable work to continue.




